guests. Trustee David MacMahon delivered greetings from the Maine Community College System. Dean Roger Philippon recognized numerous academic achievements of the graduating class, including Student of the Year Robyn Rawle of Buckfield and All-Maine Academic Team members Misty Edgecomb of Auburn and Melissa Potter of Lewiston.

Auburn Mayor Jonathan LaBonte delivered the commencement address. "Being here tonight, you've proven you can learn in the classroom, and the beauty of an education at Central Maine Community College is that the faculty keeps their eye on the application of that knowledge outside the four walls of a lab or lecture hall," LaBonte said. "The first lesson in the art of whatever you find passion in will be to muster all the creativity you have and apply it. Second lesson is to repeat."

Graduates of more than 40 different programs at CMCC earned their associate degree, certificate, or advanced certificate credentials this year. Among those programs with the largest number of graduates are Business Administration and Management; Criminal Justice; Automotive Technology; Precision Machining Technology; and General Studies.

ROBYN RAWLE IS THE 2017 STUDENT OF THE YEAR

ROBYN RAWLE OF BUCKFIELD HAS BEEN SELECTED AS THE CMCC STUDENT OF THE YEAR. She and six other Maine community college students were honored recently for their academic success and campus and community involvement at a ceremony in Augusta hosted by the Maine Community College System (MCCS) Board of Trustees.

Robyn graduated this spring from CMCC with President's Honors, the highest academic honors at the College. Active in the TRIO Student Success Center, she worked as a tutor and conducted impromptu study groups in math and science. She was a student in the Life Sciences Honors Program, served as a lab assistant, and was an officer in the college chapter of Phi Theta Kappa, the international honor society for two-year colleges.

A stroke victim who suffers from diabetes, Robyn has also worked as a teacher's aid, helping students with disabilities. Her family owns and operates a horse farm in Buckfield, where she has for many years given horseback riding lessons and therapeutic riding for people with disabilities.

Robyn has accepted a merit-based scholarship to attend the University of New England in the fall, where she will pursue their "4+1 B.S./M.S." in Marine Sciences.

In addition to being recognized as Students of the Year, Robyn is receiving a \$1,000 John H. Lapoint, Jr. Leadership Award. Mr. Lapoint was president of UF Strainrite in Lewiston and a trustee of the Maine Community College System. After his death in 1995, his widow, Jana Lapoint, served on the Board from 1995 to 2006 and helped establish the fund for the annual awards.

FANIE WABWENDE HONORED AS LEON GORMAN SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENT



SEVEN MAINE COMMUNITY COLLEGE STUDENTS, INCLUDING FANIE WABWENDE FROM CMCC, WERE AWARDED SCHOLARSHIPS IN HONOR OF LEON A. GORMAN at a ceremony held May 15 at L.L.Bean's Corporate Headquarters in Freeport.

This is the second year the scholarship has been given and marks the first time the award has been expanded from one recipient to seven, one from each of Maine's community colleges. (The sole awardee last year was Nicole Labby from CMCC). Each Gorman Scholar receives an award equal to a full year of tuition at a Maine community college.

The expansion of the scholarship to seven students was made possible by the generosity of Lisa Gorman, who last year announced an additional gift to the scholarship fund in her late husband's name. The Leon A. Gorman Endowed Scholarship was established in 2014 by the children of Leon and Lisa Gorman in honor of Mr. Gorman's 80th birthday. The scholarship supports Maine community college students who demonstrate strong academic achievement, financial need, and a commitment to community service, a hallmark of the scholarship's namesake.

"Leon would be proud to be associated with these outstanding students, and our family is delighted that the scholarship is now available to a student at each of the community colleges. We are pleased to support their educational aspirations and the good work of Maine's community colleges," said Lisa Gorman on behalf of her family.

Leon Gorman, the longtime president and CEO of L.L.Bean, was deeply committed to the people and places of Maine. Recognizing the power and potential of Maine's community colleges to transform people's lives, Mr. and Mrs. Gorman worked quietly behind the scenes supporting the colleges. The couple was central to the 2009 establishment and success of The Foundation for Maine's Community Colleges for which Mrs. Gorman continues to serve as vice chair.

FOUR MUSTANG HOOPSTERS ARE MOVING UP



The Athletic Department held a signing ceremony recently for four men's basketball players who have signed letters of intent to continue playing in college or in an Australian league. Athletic Director and Head Basketball Coach Dave Gonyea announced that the four players have received these attractive offers because of their accomplishments on the court and in the classroom.

Pietro Badalassi has accepted academic and athletic scholarships to attend the University of St. Francis in Joliet, Illinois. The Canberra, Australia native is graduating with high honors in the Business Administration and Management program. A two-time winner of the CMCC Male Student Athlete of the Year Award, Badalassi was USCAA All-American and runner-up Player of the Year in the Yankee Conference this year.

According to St. Francis head coach Ryan Marks, "Pietro is a versatile wing forward who can play multiple positions and brings significant toughness, leadership, and decision-making to our squad."

Cornelius Lawhorn will attend Lincoln Christian University (LCU) in Illinois on an athletic scholarship. The Georgia native averaged 11.4 points and five rebounds per game and led the team in charges this past season. A business major at CMCC, he will continue his studies in business at LCU. LCU Coach Donny Aeits had this to say about Lawhorn: "All of us here at LCU are extremely excited about the signing of Cornelius. He is the kind of person and player that we look for . . . to be a leader both on and off the court."

Sheveran Hardy of New Britain, Connecticut will be moving on to the University of Maine at Augusta, where he will major in Mental Health and Human Services. At CMCC, he played in 31 games and averaged 6.5 points, 2.5 assists, and 2.1 rebounds per game. According to UMA head coach Jim Ford: "Shev's talents at the guard position will improve the Moose need for balanced scoring and floor leadership. His speed and athleticism will be a boost to our defensive play and scoring in transition."

Rob Skinner has accepted an offer to play semi-professional basketball in Australia. A native of Winsted, Connecticut, Skinner was named a USCAA Second-Team All-American this year and recently was honored with the title of "Mr. CM Basketball." Skinner will be moving to Darwin, Australia to play in the Darwin Basketball Association.

All four players spoke about the strong supportive community they have enjoyed at CMCC, both in the classroom and on the court. Lawhorn noted that the men's and women's teams, the coaching and conditioning staff and their fans "really formed one big family." The players stressed that excellence was always the goal, with Skinner adding that being a student athlete at CMCC is all about "how good do you want to be?"

Nursing Faculty Published

Three members of the nursing faculty and the director of the TRIO program at Central Maine Community College have written an article that has been published in the April issue of *Teaching and Learning in Nursing*, the official journal of the Organization for Associate Degree Nursing.



Nursing department chair Kathy McManus, instructors Sharon Kinney and Kathleen Montegut, along with Terry Charlton from TRIO, authored the article titled "[Nursing Boot Camp: A Project in an ADN Program to Increase First-Year Nursing Students' Confidence.](#)"

The article describes the CMCC nursing program's efforts to decrease the attrition rate in the first nursing course. Wanting to improve student success, the faculty offered a daylong "Nursing Boot Camp" prior to students starting their first year in the program. Students who attended reported a significant increase in their confidence when starting their first semester. In addition, faculty members reported improvement in how students were managing their multiple responsibilities at the beginning of the semester.

The article is also available on ScienceDirect, making it accessible to over 15 million scientists around the globe.

Michelle Ramsey Named Certified Nurse Educator

Nursing instructor Michelle Ramsey has earned the Certified Nurse Educator (CNE) designation from the National League for Nursing (NLN). She earned this prestigious certification after meeting strict eligibility criteria and successfully completing a rigorous certification exam.

Ramsey joined the nursing faculty at CMCC in 2006 after she earned her MSN from the University of Southern Maine. She currently is the simulation coordinator for the student clinical experiences. In addition, she continues to work part time at Memorial Hospital in New Hampshire and at Stephens Memorial Hospital in Norway, Maine. She joins three other certified nurse educators at CMCC: Sharon Kinney, Peter Miller and Kathy McManus.

"The NLN's Academic Nurse Educator Certification program has conferred new visibility and stature upon the academic nursing community that is long overdue," said Dr. Beverly Malone, CEO of the NLN. "Through the certification program, we have made clear to the ranks of higher education that the role of nurse educator is an advanced professional practice discipline with a defined practice setting and demonstrable standards of excellence."

The NLN offers faculty development, networking opportunities, testing services, nursing research grants, and public policy initiatives to its 37,000 individual and more than 1,200 institutional members comprising nursing education programs across the spectrum of higher education and health care organizations.



TRIO Students at CMCC Earn Scholarships

The TRIO Student Support Services Program has awarded nearly \$12,000 in scholarships to 13 students this semester. These scholarship recipients were selected in recognition of their achievements and determination to succeed at the college.

The federal TRIO program, created in 1965, focuses on assisting first-generation, low income, or disabled students to succeed in higher education. TRIO staff help students with academic advising, time and money management, financial aid, accessing college resources, and access to cultural enrichment opportunities. Now in its twenty-first year at CMCC, TRIO is a selective program whose goals are student persistence, academic achievement, graduation, and transfer to a baccalaureate program.

Instructor Discusses Watergate in the Wake of Comey Firing



The recent firing of FBI director James Comey and talk of possible tape recordings in the Oval Office have brought about some comparisons to Watergate.

Chris Beam, who teaches history at CMCC and at the University of Southern Maine, worked at the National Archives in Washington, D.C. from 1977 to 1988, where he

spent more than four years processing the Nixon White House tapes,

"I estimate that I listened to 1,500 of the approximately 3,700 hours of conversation in the White House taping system, which was in place from February 1971 to July 1973," recalls Beam. "The conversations I reviewed included many hours of discussion of Watergate, Vietnam, and the 1972 presidential election," he added.

Beam, who is a former director of the Muskie Archives at Bates College, [was interviewed recently about this experience by Pat Callaghan of WCSH-TV.](#)

While Beam says there are echoes of Watergate in what President Trump has done, he believes it is too soon to know how this will all turn out.

A graduate of Williams College, Beam is a Marine Corps veteran of the Vietnam War. He earned a Ph.D. in history from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. He has taught numerous courses at CMCC and other institutions on the Vietnam War, the Nixon presidency and all phases of U.S. history.
