## CMCC HOLDS 55TH ANNUAL COMMENCEMENT CEREMONY AT THE ANDROSCOGGIN BANK COLISÉE

Members of the Class of 2019 at Central Maine Community College participated in Commencement Thursday, May 16 before a packed house of family, friends, and supporters at the Androscoggin Bank Colisée in Lewiston. Numbering over 575, the largest graduating class in the history of the College marched into the Colisée under the familiar strains of "Pomp and Circumstance."

Faculty members Carl Hinkley and Kevin Latendresse served as grand marshal and faculty marshal respectively and led the processional of graduates, faculty, administration and distinguished guests. Trustee David MacMahon and System President David Daigler delivered greetings from the Maine Community College System. Dean Roger Philippon recognized numerous academic achievements of the graduating class, including Student of the Year Kayla Thayer and All-Maine Academic Team members Tyler Hayes, Zakiya Sheikh, and Rusty Vining.


Commencement speaker Dirk Lesko, president of Bath Iron Works, urged the graduates to hang onto what they have gained in school and to never stop learning.

"You need to keep applying that skill for the rest of your lives, because although people say that life is short, you're probably going to be around for quite a while, so you'd better be good at something," Lesko said. "Whether you recognize it or not, the most important thing you're taking away is that you've learned how to learn. When you understand what that means, and you keep applying those skills for the rest of your lives, you'll have the chance to feel the same way you do tonight, over and over again."

President Scott Knapp presented the graduates with their diplomas, assisted by Dean of Academic Affairs Betsy Libby and members of the faculty. Graduates of more than 40 different programs at CMCC earned their associate degree, certificate, or advanced certificate credentials this year. ## IT'S GAME ON WITH ESPORTS ARENA GRAND OPENING

 A large crowd descended on Kirk Hall on Saturday April 6 as interested students and their families were among the first to experience CMCC's new Esports Arena. The only facility of its kind in the state of Maine, the 1,600 square-foot arena located in Kirk Hall is equipped with Alienware Area-51 Threadrippers; five console stations with Xbox One, PS4 Pro, and Nintendo Switch; and a Twitch broadcast booth for live streaming matches.

Esports (short for electronic sports) refers to the hugely popular and rapidly growing field of competitive video gaming. The College announced earlier this year that it is joining the National Association of Collegiate eSports (NACE) starting in the fall. Students who participate will have to meet the same requirements as other athletes at the college.

Some of the games the Esports teams will likely compete in include Fortnite, Rocket League, Apex Legends, Overwatch, League of Legends, CSGO, Rainbow Six Siege, Madden, NBA 2K, and FIFA.

Admissions Director Andrew Morong notes that CMCC will be competing largely against four-year colleges, since they comprise 90 percent of NACE membership. "We will be the only community college north of Virginia to offer competitive eSports," he added.

In addition to the Esports teams, CMCC is also starting in the fall a degree program in Esports Management that will focus on the business aspect of Esports, such as marketing, organizing and promoting events, and utilizing digital technology.

## WORK WELL UNDERWAY ON NEW ATHLETIC FIELDS AT CMCC



Work is progressing well on our new and expanded athletic fields. Fields will be ready for play in fall 2019.

The complex, which will include lights and a synthetic surface, will include NCAA-sized competition fields for baseball, softball, and soccer. The baseball and softball fields will be situated at opposite ends, with the soccer field overlapping both outfields. Baseball and softball teams will be able to play at the same time.

C.H. Stevenson, Inc. of Wayne is the general contractor for the project. Excavation is expected to begin in early spring and the fields should be ready for use in fall 2019.

In addition to women's soccer, softball, basketball, volleyball, and cross country, CMCC offers soccer, baseball, basketball, ice hockey, and cross country for men. The hockey team plays at the Norway Savings Bank Arena, just down the road from the campus.

## NEW PROGRAMS IN PLUMBING & HEATING, HVAC/R, & FACILITIES MANAGEMENT BEGIN THIS FALL


 The College is still accepting applications for admission to three new technical programs that it will launch in the fall in these high pay/high need areas: Plumbing and Heating Technology; HVAC/R (Heating, Ventilation, Air Conditioning and Refrigeration) Technology; and Facilities Maintenance and Management.

Work will begin soon to transform the former Criminal Justice space in Jalbert Hall to a state-of-the-art lab that will include hands-on, mock-up workstations and advanced simulators that provide students with a lab environment that mirrors workplace situations. Graduates of these programs will be qualified for employment in building supervision/ maintenance, installation, service, or sales positions with heating or HVAC/R contractors, utility companies, and fuel oil businesses. With additional experience, graduates may pursue opportunities as managers, supervisors, or operators of their own business.

In Plumbing and HVAC/R, students will have the option of pursuing either the associate in applied science degree or a one-year certificate, which essentially consists of the first year's curriculum.

## NEW PROGRAM IN JUSTICE STUDIES BEGINS IN FALL

*Pending Board Approval*

We are pleased to announce the newest program at CMCC: the Associate in Science (A.S.) Degree in Justice Studies. Designed to prepare students for transfer to four-year institution, this interdisciplinary program provides foundational learning in criminal justice and related social sciences and serves as a foundation for studies in several areas, including social services, advocacy, community development, law, and corrections.

Some of the course in the program include:

- Introduction to Criminal Justice
- Criminal Psychology
- Criminology
- The Juvenile Justice System
- Research Methods for Justice Studies


### **Non-Academic Requirements**

Students in the Justice Studies program will be subject to a criminal background check. A criminal conviction will not automatically prevent a person from acceptance into the program. The applicant would be denied acceptance if a she or he has a disqualifying criminal conviction or pending criminal charges. Such conviction or conduct prohibits a person from being certified or licensed as a police officer in the State of Maine.

## LHS CLASSMATES OF MEDAL OF HONOR WINNER PROVIDE SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS

Members of the Lewiston High School Class of 1967 presented a check for \$1,500 recently to the CM Education Foundation for scholarships in memory of their late classmate, Thomas J. McMahon.

In 1969, Specialist Fourth Class McMahon was serving in Vietnam as a medic when his company came under heavy fire and three soldiers were seriously injured. McMahon left his covered position and ran through intense enemy fire to the side of one of the wounded, administered first aid, and carried him to safety. He was then hit by an exploding mortar round while returning a second injured man to safety. Refusing medical attention, McMahon fell mortally wounded before he could rescue the third man. In recognition of his

bravery and service beyond the call of duty, McMahon was posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor, the United States military's highest decoration.

Class members also raised funds to place a granite bench in McMahon's honor in the Veterans Memorial Park in Lewiston. The McMahon Elementary School in Lewiston is named in his honor.

## TRIO STUDENTS EARN SCHOLARSHIPS

Our TRIO Student Support Services program has awarded over \$12,000 in scholarships to 17 students this year. These scholarship recipients were selected in recognition of their achievements and determination to succeed at the college. The federal TRIO program, created in



1965, focuses on assisting first-generation, low income, or disabled students to succeed in higher education. TRIO staff help students with academic advising, time and money management, financial aid, accessing college resources, and access to cultural enrichment opportunities. Now in its twenty-first year at CMCC, TRIO is a selective program whose goals are student persistence, academic achievement, graduation, and transfer to a baccalaureate program.

## CMCC STUDENT EARNS LUMBER DEALERS SCHOLARSHIP



Maxwell Stanley of Vinalhaven has been awarded the Retail Lumber Dealers Association of Maine Brian C. Thayer Memorial Scholarship.

A graduate of Vinalhaven High School, Stanley is a full-time, second-year student in the Building Construction Technology (BCT) program. After he completes the program, Stanley hopes to return to



the island to live and work in the construction field.

The BCT program prepares students for employment in construction-related fields. Through a combination of classroom study and hands-on lab work students become broadly familiar with methods, standards, and codes associated with the construction industry. The BCT program now offers a “job-site” track that includes paid on-the-job training for academic credit. Students rotate between seven-week increments of job-site training and on-campus courses.
